THINKING OF THE ELDERLY DURING DISASTERS

In the past few years many people have experienced different kinds of disasters. There have been tornadoes, wildfires and even floods. When thinking of disasters who and what groups of individuals are thought of immediately? Is it families, children, developmentally disabled or the elderly? The elderly are usually the last ones to be seen about. This is mainly because people seem to think that the elderly are with family or in an institutional setting and are being well taken care of. Even if this may be true, it is still best to check up on the elderly first, just to make sure they are being taken care of.



Some of the elderly needs that should be on the top of the list are: hydration, nutrition and medical. Elderly are considered very vulnerable adults, which makes it more important to check on them first. They may not be able to walk, see or even speak. A lot of them may be in or end up in the nursing home just because of those exact same reasons. Just because they may be in the nursing home doesn't mean they don't need the help from people out in the community. If the disaster hits the community, those that are in the nursing home will need the help, just the same. This is because they have no place to go. They are unable to fend for themselves.

To make sure that the elderly in the nursing homes are taken care of during a disaster or just in general, make a visit to the nursing home. Take the time to stop and visit to make sure that they are receiving electricity for those that need oxygen and plenty of food and water, so they are not dehydrated or starving during the disasters. Stop by in general to make sure they are getting the care they are supposed to be getting every day.

CHANGES TO MEDICARE IN 2020

The cost for Medicare has changed for the year 2020. As far as Part A, if you or your spouse worked more than 10 years, there will usually not be a charge for the coverage. If you worked between 7.5 and 10 years, there is a \$458 per month premium for Part A. With Part B, the premium is no longer \$134; it is now \$144.60. The amount you are responsible for is still 20% for most



services that are covered by Part B. If you have any questions, ASCOG AAA has three Medicare Certified Counselors to assist you. 
FREDERICK FANTASTIC OYSTER FRY AND CRAFT SHOW
