The site

includes tools which provide data and recommended action steps for building effective grassroots solutions to the addiction crisis.

"An Acceptable Loss" (excerpt from Oklahoma Alliance on Aging): The novel coronavirus of 2019 has had a permanent impact on the American lexicon. Population Changes for ASCOG Members: ASCOG members include 72 towns and cities. In calculating member dues for FY 2021, we found that 44 of those members experienced decreases in estimated 2019 populations, and 26 members had increases in estimated populations. Population declines totaled 8,376 people and



increases totaled 6,730 people for a net decline in member population of 1,646. Town of Hydro had the largest percentage increase in population with 35.4%, and Town of Carnegie had the largest percentage decrease with 20.6%.

Six of ASCOG's eight member counties experienced declines in estimated 2019 populations. Those counties were Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Jefferson, Stephens, and Tillman. The total decline was 7,831 persons. Two

counties, Grady and McClain, experienced an increase in estimated population of 9,371 people. The net increase in populations of all eight counties was 1,540. A net increase in county populations with a net decrease in populations of cities and towns implies that populations of unincorporated areas increased in 2019. The largest percentage increase was McClain County at 17.3% while Tillman County had the largest decline at 9.3%.

The 65-and-older population grew by over a third (34.2% or 13,787,044) during the past decade, and by 3.2% (1,688,924) from 2018 to 2019...according to the Census Bureau's 2019 Population Estimates.

The 2019 estimated populations came from census.gov.

Households: The majority of census offices across the country will begin follow-up work on August 11. All offices will conclude work no later than October 31. Households can still respond now by completing and mailing back the paper questionnaire they received, by responding

online at 2020census.gov, or by phone at 844-330-2020. Households can also respond online or by phone in one of 13 languages and find assistance in many more. Those that respond will not need to be visited to obtain their census response. and grants to eligible entities in rural areas and towns for maintaining or developing water and waste disposal and solid waste facilities. Project priorities include populations less than 1,000, correcting health/sanitary standards, low income, mergers, serving new users, leverage funds and target areas.
